
Feet in the sand

Where find fresh fish?

If there's one thing we particularly appreciate when staying on the island, it's cooking locally-caught fresh fish or seafood. There are around twenty fishermen on St-Martin.

Every Wednesday and Saturday morning, the freshly caught fish is sold at the fish market, on the seafront in Marigot, next to the fruit, vegetable and spices stalls. On the way to Orient Bay in Mont-Vernon, the Cabane du Pêcheur also sells fish and seafood several times a week. Max is a passionate offshore fisherman who uses crates to catch red snapper and practices long-line fishing, and then sells the catch from his long nights out at sea, on the side of the road.

Local fish also features on the menus of countless restaurants, whichsometimes offer fresh lobster that is kept in crates or aquariums. On Pinel island or on the Boulevard de Grand-Case, there are always some great places to taste mahi-mahi, red snapper, tuna and lobster.

A QUICK GETAWAY

In February, in the middle of the dry season, the trade winds, the prevailing winds in the Caribbean, cool down the warm tropical air. This is the ideal period for kitesurfing and any other sports with a sail, and it is also the first chance to catch a glimpse of humpback whales. Between December and April, they come to mate and calve in our warm waters before heading back to the North Atlantic, treating us to an incredible show while they're here. There are many charter companies organizing day trips out on motorboats or sailing boats, to see these impressive marine mammals. You might see a fin graciously gliding through the water, or even a magnificent jump... but you'll have to be patient during your day trip on the water, and the reward will definitely be worth it, for a magical moment guaranteed for people of all ages.

TREAT YOURSELF! Adèle & Gabrielle, exceptional French pastries



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Alain, his wife Adèle and his sister-in-law Gabrielle, three passionate, self-taught pastry chefs decided to come together and create a topquality business on the friendly island, despite the current health crisis. "We wanted to give St-Martin's reputation a boost, and bring something fresh and new to the island", explained Alain. And we decided to do this with "an exceptional product": original creations "with carefully thought-out flavors and textures... Our pastries have to taste as good as they look". At Adèle & Gabrielle's, everything is homemade. The two pastry chefs only use top-quality ingredients: local and seasonal fruit, natural flavors, no artificial colorings or additives... And pastries "with 30% less sugar". "We want to offer delicious pastries, that are not too sweet. And above all, we want to see smiles on people's faces when eating them», says Alain. Adèle & Gabrielle is first and foremost about a concept, "a world". The risk they took seems to be paying off, when we see that this little Parisian-style establishment is always busy ever since it opened in Nettle Bay.



The Paris-Brest

RECIPE FOR ONE OF THE CLASSICS



1. To make the cream, begin by bringing the milk to a boil. Whisk the egg yolks with the sugar until they whiten, then add the cornflour. Pour this mixture over the boiling milk and whisk in gently. Thicken over a medium heat, stirring until it boils. Leave to cool.

2. Beat the butter until creamy. Add the cream already made, and the hazelnut power, all the while whisking the mixture to let in the air.

3. Preheat the oven to 180°C. Cover the oven tray with baking paper. For the dough, bring the water and milk to a boil with the butter, sugar and a pinch of salt. Add the flour and cornflour all at once. Mix in vigorously until the dough no longer sticks to the sides of the pan. Take off the heat, whisk in the eggs one by one. Stop whisking when the dough is smooth and creamy.

4. Using a piping bag, make a 20 cm circle with the dough, onto a baking tray. Make a second circle over the top, then a third. Decorate with almonds.
5. Put in the oven for 30 minutes, until golden brown. Leave to cool in the oven, switched off with the door open. Cut the crown in two.

6. Spread the cream onto the lower half, put the top half back on and sprinkle with icing sugar.

Adèle & Gabrielle's top tip

How to make a light version of the Paris-Brest?

"The Paris-Brest is a classic in the world of French pastries, and everyone loves it but it is often quite heavy due to the butter cream. To make a light and airy cream, I recommend whipping it a second time after cooling, before piping. The secret is also to use a little less sugar. It still needs to be tasty but when it's made with less sugar, the flavor of the cream will be more prominent. As for the dough, to make sure it is crispy on the outside and soft on the inside, it has to be whipped and then eaten the same day."

Ingrédients

For the dough :

8 tbsp milk and water 1/4 cup butter 2 tsp sugar 1/4 cup + 1 tbsp flour 2 eggs 2 tbsp + 2 tsp cornflour 2 tbsp + 2 tsp flaked almonds Salt Icing sugar

For the cream :

3/4 cup + 1 tbsp milk 3 egg yolks 1/2 cup + 1 tbsp softened butter 2 tbsp + 2 tsp cornflour 1/4 cup + 1 tbsp sugar 1/2 cup + 1 tbsp hazelnut powder





The currency of St-Martin... Or rather, the currencies of St-Martin

The official currencies are the euro on the French side, and the guilder (NAF) on the Dutch side, but American dollars are accepted all over the island and are frequently used. Euros are also accepted in most shops on the Dutch side. The current exchange rate is often applied, but some shops and restaurants apply the rate of 1:1. So be aware of this when paying your bill.

Most bank cards are accepted on the island, however checks are often refused. There are a few bureau de change and banks on the island, but on the French side, there are not many banks where you can withdraw dollars.

Did you know?

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St-Martin is the smallest territory in the world to be divided into two different nations.

The island was discovered on November 11th 1493 by Christopher Columbus, and was given the name of the patron saint for that day. During the 16th century, privateers and freebooters from all over Europe came to the island, for its protected mooring and abundant salt reserves. On March 23rd 1648, the French and the Dutch signed the Treaty of Concordia, and the same name was given to the mountain upon which the agreement was signed. That's how two nations came to share the island: the French occupy the north (21 square miles) and the Dutch occupy the south (13 square miles). There is no physical border separating the two sides, and people and goods can circulate freely across the whole island. According to legend, a beer-drinking Dutchman and a wine-drinking Frenchman, ran across the island to establish the border between the two nations. Every year, a race is organized around the island, to mark St-Martin's Day, on November 11th
