Grand Case Tuesdays let's get the party started!



Whales looking for warm waters to reproduce in meet around Anguilla, St. Martin, and St.
Barts from December to June. This sanctuary hosts their seasons of love and the birth of their babies, since they swim back to give birth here, 11 months later, after completing their migration that leads them to the Caribbean.

Being able to watch them year after year **is truly magical**, but there are rules to follow. To see them along their way,

 conditions must be ideal. The seas and winds should be calm. Trained and certified "AGOA whale watching" pros in the field will take you to where you can see them, while keeping both you and them safe.

You have to be very respectful toward these moving giants of the sea. Their songs can even be heard with the boats' sound equipment.

Whale watching is so much more than a vacation memory; it's a gift of nature and an incredible experience.

Pig's feet soup

Pig's feet soup is a **typical West Indies recipe!** It's a **traditional dish** shared with family, savored early in the morning before work, or after partying all night. **Trotter soup is oft enjoyed at dinner** during chillier evenings.



DIRECTIONS

 \star Halve the pig's feet lengthwise, drizzle them in lemon juice, and simmer them in a pot full of water with bay leaves, thyme, an onion stuck with cloves, salt, and a celery stick for an hour.

★ Wash and peel the vegetables and cut them into small cubes, though the pieces of turban squash should be larger than the rest.

★ Remove the meat and set it aside.

 \bigstar Place the vegetables and the bouillon cube in the broth and cook for 30mn, then put the meat back in.

- ★ Mash the cooked turban squash to color the soup orange and toss in the vermicelli or rice. Simmer the soup for another 15 minutes or so.
- ★ Turn off the heat and wait for the soup to cool a bit before eating.

 \bigstar It will be even better the next day, once the flavors of the ingredients have had a chance to blend together.

- ★ 2 PIG'S FEET
- ★ 2 POTATOES
- ★ 4 CARROTS
- ★ 2 LEEKS
- ★2TURNIPS
- ★ 1 PIECE OF CABBAGE
- ★1 SLICE OF TURBAN SQUASH
- ★ 1 ONION STUCK WITH CLOVES
- ★1LEMON
- ★ 2 GENEROUS HANDFULS OF
- VERMICELLI OR RICE
- ★1 CELERY STICK
- ★ 2 BAY LEAVES
- ★1SPRIG OF THYME
- ★ 1 CHICKEN BOUILLON CUBE
- ★ SALT

Volunteers come on site every other Saturday to help build the site that will eventually become the ecovillage Kevin Baly dreamed up.

The concept's founder inherited a taste for innovation from his ancestors, the Rohan family. The plans feature dome houses, Creole huts, greenhouses, workshops, a communal kitchen, an aquaponic tank, sustainable farming, wells, and recycling. Living in harmony with nature is the goal. Here, everyone's laying the groundwork, planting, building and committing to founding this ecological and cultural village, intrinsically tied to traditions and the elements. Everyone is invited to contribute as little or as much as they can. The community is growing. It seeks to embody the idea of stripping back to basics, grow medicinal plants, bring back to light forgotten knowledge and move away from standard economic models.

It's a great initiative and a new way to look at St. Martin!



Useful TIPS

Dear visitors, we want you to know that the power supplied on the French side of our island is 220V, 60 Hertz. If your appliances (hairdryer, straightener, electric razors, epilators, electric toothbrushes, cameras, computers, etc.) are designed for 110V, make sure to bring a 110V-220V transformer and adaptors for the plugs.

You can plug in and charge your cell phones, tablets, and more with adaptors.

Local electronics stores also sell them. Hotels, villas, and vacation rentals usually have a few on hand and can loan one to you. Don't forget to ask when you book!
